

# CLEP EXAMS – College Level Exam Program

## Warren County Career Center South is a **CLEP Testing Site** -

The College Level Examination Program allows people who have acquired knowledge outside the usual educational settings – through independent or prior study, on-the-job training, professional development, cultural pursuits or internships – to show that they have learned college-level material so that they can bypass certain college courses. Exams are given on the following schedule at the Warren County Career Center **South Campus**:

The cost includes a nonrefundable \$25 registration fee at least 5 business days prior to the test and a \$60 fee made payable to CLEP using a check, money order or credit/debit card the day of the test. There is a \$10 fee for a required essay. You must also include a completed Registration-Admission Form for each test 5 business days before your exam date.

## Before taking the CLEP Exam

Before you take a CLEP exam, check directly with the college or university you plan to attend to make sure they grant credit, how much credit, for what exams and the scores required. There are 2,900 colleges and universities that grant credit, but they each have their own CLEP policy. Usually colleges award CLEP credit to their enrolled students only.

The College-Level Examination Program policy is that candidates may not repeat a CLEP exam of the same title within six months. Scores of those exams repeated earlier than six months will be canceled and test fees forfeited.

## What to bring to the test

1. Picture ID – current driver’s license, current state-issued or federal ID card, current passport, naturalization card or certification of citizenship.
2. A secondary form of ID such as a current employee ID, a current student ID, a social security card, a military ID, or an unused ID from #1.
3. The Examination Fee for each test (\$60 Credit Card preferred, money order or check) payable to College-Level Examination Program with additional \$10 required if you take the optional essay – also payable to College-Level Examination Program is due the day of the test.
4. Directions to the Warren County Career Center - **SOUTH CAMPUS**.
